Activities and Lesson Plan

Page to Stage

Bringing a story to life on stage is difficult. It sometimes means cutting out events, storylines and even whole characters. Our playwright turned some of Dickens' prose into narration for the actors, interspersing it with lines spoken by the characters in the story. What are some things the playwright did to turn the story into the play?

Write a Review

After seeing the production, have each student write a review of Orlando Shakes' production. The review should include one paragraph each for acting, design and special effects.

What lesson does Scrooge learn? Are we responsible for others less fortunate than we?
